

Did you know that a few years ago, the Chamber launched a new tool to promote our local non-profit organizations? It's called Chamber For Good and can be found at: www. chamberforgood. com or through the Chamber website. The Chamber for

Good system leverages the strength and credibility of our chamber of commerce to shine a bright light on the great charities and causes that labor away on behalf our fellow community members.

We are the only Chamber and only community in South Dakota to offer this great 3x3 community-engagement tool that makes it easy for residents to support local charities and causes. The 3x3 describes the three horizontal 'trailheads' of giving: donate money, donate time (volunteer), and donate items. And it describes the three levels of residential engagement (from most engaged to passive): browse needs, make item or volunteer



'offers', or receive weekly automated 'community needs' email.

All 501c3 organizations that are based in (or have extensive activities within) our community are eligible to have a FREE profile on Chamber for Good. These organizations can post financial, volunteer and item needs, as well as events and programs coming up. It's a great resource, so if you operate or volunteer for a local non-profit, go to the site and submit your information.

Additionally, residents have a central location where they can browse the needs of local charities. Residents can also make item donations or volunteer "offers". You can select charities based on need or type. Chamber for Good makes it easy to GIVE LOCAL and build up those causes that make such an impact in our own community.

If you have not already done so, go to the site and register your email address. Each Monday you will receive a single automated email listing the item and volunteer needs of local charities. From that email you may choose to respond to one of the needs, but even if you don't, we hope that you will at least be willing to review the needs and see what our community stands in need of. There is no obligation of any kind, just a willingness to be made aware of the needs that exist in our community.





Winners Announced for Big Idea Competition

The 2018 BIG Idea Competition was a BIG success with 244 entries involving over 356 students from 35 schools. The event wrapped up Wednesday, December 5th, on the campus of Northern State University and the winners were determined from among the eight final entries with over \$6,000 in cash and scholarships awarded.

Kendra Kleven and Avery Weinheimer of Sully Buttes High School took first place with Helping Hearts Delivery Service which aims to deliver groceries weekly and bring hot meals five days a week to the elderly of Onida, SD. Their prizes included a \$1,000 cash prize, a \$1,000 scholarship to NSU, a \$1,000 scholarship to Presentation College and a \$1,000 scholarship to the South Dakota School of Mines & Technology. Second place went to Butterstick, by Jade Parkin of Rapid City Stevens High School, which is a product where butter will conveniently be stored and ready for use in all situations and for all ages. Second

place prizes include \$500 cash, \$500 Presentation College scholarship and \$500 NSU scholarship. The \$250 third place prize went to The 'Wich Doctor by Hattie Muellenbach of Milbank High School, which is a food truck specializing in gourmet sandwiches.

The Marketing Design competition is an option for students to create an ad for their business idea. The \$500 cash award was sponsored by McQuillen Creative Group and fifty-two entries were judged in this category. The winner was Houghtaling Ultrasound by Danielle Houghtaling of Doland High School which addresses the need for ultrasound services in the state of South Dakota for the sheep and goat industries. Houghtaling Ultrasound was also the winner of the newly sponsored \$500 cash prize of the Food Animal Agriculture award. The category prize is sponsored by Midwest Ag Supply and thirty-three

entries were in this category.

In the Wellness Category sponsored by Sanford Health with a \$500 cash prize, there were forty-three entries. The winner was Helping Hearts Delivery Service by Kendra Kleven and Avery Weinheimer of Sully Buttes High School.

For the first time, the BIG Idea Competition was able to offer an award for teachers. The new prize, Partners in Business Award, is sponsored by Angelhaus to reward the networking and



Encourage yourself to eat right, your way. At home and at work, too. Eating right doesn't have to be complicated. Here

are some healthy tips to help you make changes towards a healthy 2019. Starting simple may lead to bigger rewards.

Follow MyPlate. This tool will help you create a more balance diet. Aim to make half your plate half fruits and vegetables, a quarter of your plate whole grains and a quarter lean protein, while choosing low-fat or non-fat dairy. Banish that brown bag boredom by trying low sodium vegetable soup with whole grain crackers or a salad of mixed greens with low-fat dressing and hard-boiled

Fix Healthy snacks. Healthy snacks can sustain your energy levels between meals. Choose from two or more foods groups when picking out snacks. Try raw veggies with low-fat cottage cheese or a

cottage cheese, or a peanut butter with an apple or banana. Or try salsa and baked tortilla chips.

Rethink your drink. Drinks with added sugars can contribute to empty calories and little or no nutrition. Substitute water for sugary drinks to reduce calories. Aim for eight, 8 oz glasses of water per day.

Stay active at work. Take a 5-minute stretching break or a 10-minute walking break. Take the stairs instead of the elevator. Park your car farther away from the door. Choose an activity you enjoy to do. Set a calendar reminder to remind you to get up from your desk.



Don't forget food safety. About 1 in 6 American will experience food poisoning each year. Stop the spread of harmful bacteria by practicing good food safety. Use an insulated lunch bag. Keep hot foods hot by using an insulated bottle. Provide at least two cold sources if lunches contain perishable foods.

Find what works best for you.

Once you find a plan that works for you, make it a routine. Consistency will lead you towards your biggest reward, a healthier you.



Ten Years Making Bowls and Feeding Souls

The 10th annual Empty Bowls Meal and silent auction is Saturday, March 23 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Yelduz Shrine Center at 802 S. Main Street in Aberdeen.

Empty Bowls Aberdeen is a volunteer-based community project that uses creative

arts and education to work on a social problem – hunger. Volunteers of all ages and walks are provided supplies at no cost, September through March, to make clay bowls. These building times provide an opportunity to experience the arts in an inclusive culture of charity and giving. Every year there have been over 200 volunteers who have used 525 pounds of clay to create over 400 bowls. Volunteers help in some part of the process - either building a bowl or glazing one. There could be as many

as six people who have had a part in one bowl between the building, glazing and firing process.

Guests attending the meal make a suggested donation of \$20, thoughtfully hand pick a special bowl to take home knowing their donation has helped the community. Raising awareness of local hunger issues is a major

goal of the project. Approximately 90% of the raised funds are given to local hunger entities while the other 10% pays for expenses such as pottery materials and dinner supplies.

In addition to the dinner, a silent auction is held to help raise funds. Many handcrafted items are donated and sold to the highest bidder. Since the start of Empty Bowls Aberdeen in 2009, over \$62,000 has been given to organizations that help with hunger.

The program works in small and mid-sized communities in Midwestern states that experienced a significant influx of Scandinavian immigrants during the 1800s and 1900s and still bear signs of this heritage today. Arts Midwest Folkefest seeks to deepen awareness of Scandinavian traditions present in the Midwest while fostering curiosity and appreciation for global cultures.

Arts Midwest Folkefest is produced by Arts Midwest, a regional organization based in Minneapolis. Arts Midwest covers a substantial portion of the program cost so that communities throughout the Midwest can enjoy this multifaceted experience. Generous support is also received from Margaret A. Governor Signs Bill Moving NSU Regional Sports Complex Forward

With the governor's signature in place, Northern State University's on-campus regional sports complex is moving forward.

Gov. Kristi Noem has signed House Bill 1037, which authorizes the South Dakota Board of Regents to contract for the construction of the sports complex on the NSU campus.

The bill's approval sets in motion the final project of the Educational Impact Campaign, a collaborative effort between Northern and the South Dakota School for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

"This feels like another game-changing moment, much like when we first kicked off the campaign a little over a year ago," said NSU President Dr. Tim Downs. "While it's exciting to have that final piece of the puzzle in place, the campaign now shifts to completing fundraising efforts – and a high-quality facility that will benefit our entire region."

The Educational Impact Campaign, which first kicked off in fall 2017, involves three projects funded almost entirely by private donations. Besides the sports complex, that includes the
Athletic and
Recreation
Fields project,
which opened
in fall 2018,
and the new
SDSBVI,
currently
under
construction
at the former
NSU Jerde Hall site.

Support has been strong throughout the campaign, with numerous pledges from individual donors, area businesses and the city of Aberdeen. That support hasn't gone unnoticed.

At HB1037's hearing before the Legislature's Joint Committee on Appropriations prior to approval in the House and Senate, Sen. Justin Cronin said the fact that the whole region is supporting this project is immense.

"You should be very proud of your alumni and of your community," said Cronin, R-S.D.

Cronin pointed out that Northern came to the committee with a bill that's





fully funded, with a commitment to fund maintenance and repair. "How can a person sit here and say no?"

Sen. Brock Greenfield echoed Cronin's sentiments, saying the area has invested countless millions of dollars into this project.

"Here's a case in point in which the people have said this is how they want to spend their money," said Greenfield, R-S.D. "I wholly support and endorse that, and I wish the folks at Northern well with this project, and the folks of the region well because a lot of people will be benefiting from this for years and years to come."

Ag Committee Encourages Community to Celebrate Ag Day March 14

Anyone who enjoys food, fiber or fuel is invited to celebrate National Ag Day March 14, during National Ag Week, March 10-16. Each day, farm families dedicate their efforts to provide quality care to the land, animals and environment as well as a safe and affordable product for families all over the world to enjoy.

To remind people of how important agriculture is to everyone, the Aberdeen Area Chamber Aq Committee invites the community to celebrate this essential industry. Agriculture is by far the largest sector of the economy in South Dakota. putting \$25.6 billion into our state each year.

Members of the Ag Committee will be at Kessler's from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and at Ken's SuperFair Foods from 2 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 14. Watch for the table where samples of South Dakota products and SD Ag Facts will be shared. Shoppers will be given Beef **Bucks and SD Pork Certificates** as a special thank you. Committee members would love to hear from you and share a conversation about agriculture.

Research from the Center for Food Integrity shows that 65 percent of consumers want more information about the food that they consume. They want to know is their food healthy? Is it safe? What do farmers/ ranchers do to provide quality food? Ag committee members want to initiate discussions with people in the community.

Lance Vilhauer and Kristina Signaty, members of the committee, will be on Dakota Broadcasting's In Touch radio program at 7:30 a.m. that morning to share why ag is important to them.

According to Vilhauer, "It is important for the Ag Committee to promote National Ag Day so we can celebrate and show appreciation to our area farmers and ranchers for the extremely challenging work they do every day. At a time when special interest groups are attacking modern agriculture, the products we produce, and the methods used to produce them, everyone in the Ag Community must stand up for each other. National Ag Day is a chance to shine a spotlight on how humanely our products are raised and how great stewards of the land farmers and ranchers strive to be."

Brown County ranks number one in the state in production of corn and soybeans each year. An estimated 14.26 million bushels of soybeans grown on 375,000 acres were produced in Brown County in 2017, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Corn planted on 312,000 acres produced 43.54 million bushels of corn. Statistics show an inventory of 56,000 cattle and calves for Brown County in 2018.

In addition to farmers and ranchers, statistics show that Brown County has over 4,500 jobs derived from the agricultural industry or over 16% of the working population employed in Brown County in Ag.

"Agriculture is connected to every resident in Brown County either directly or indirectly," Michael L. Bockorny, Chief Executive Officer of the Aberdeen Development Corp., said. "Furthermore, the economic impact year over year is almost immeasurable. With the pending opening of the Ag

Processina Incorporated (AGP) facility this summer the economic impact of agriculture on Brown County will be



significantly enhanced for years to come."

Drawing from a 100-mile radius, it is estimated that AGP will process nearly 40 million bushels of soybeans a year, which is a protein source in food for farm animals.

Numerous businesses provide goods and services for those in the ag industry. Area ethanol plants turn millions of bushels of corn into fuel each year. Cattle buyers purchase animals from approximately a 250-mile radius around Aberdeen for DemKota Ranch Beef, a specialty processor of high quality beef products from this area for both domestic and international consumption. It began operation in October 2015 and now has 800 employees at the plant, harvesting 1.100-1.200 animals a day.

Vilhauer noted, "You would think everyone in this country should know about agriculture since we are all dependent upon it for survival every single day. The reality is, less than 2 percent of the US population is directly employed in agriculture. I encourage all farmers and ranchers to invite urban friends and strangers alike, to see the day-to-day operations of their farms. I guarantee every visitor will leave that farm with a greater appreciation for the hard work and a true picture of the passion and care given to the land and animals. We need to shout our story, not only on National Ag Day, but every day."

Be Humble. Be Successful.

If you ask most people what makes a strong business leader, you will often hear words like visionary, bold, charismatic, passionate, energetic, or self-starter. Humility? Not so much. Yet, being humble is often a key to success in

business. You will hear successful leaders reference it as "I surrounded myself with people smarter than me" or "I had a great team". Another description I would add is 'don't be afraid to ask for help".

Here are some ways that humility exhibits itself in the workplace which may point to ways you could take action to be more humble.

1. Input is sought AND acted on/listened to. Whether there is an actual 'suggestion box' or not, be sure to solicit input from all levels of the

organization and don't presume you know what is best. The people closest to the problem often have the best ideas on how to solve it and certainly have insight on how well a proposed solution will work.

2. Management by Walking Around. Do you take time to visit with your staff informally during the week? Do you observe their work environment and how they are performing their work? Do you recognize them as fellow human beings with personal needs and concerns or as the tools you need to get the job done?

3. Willingness to Change. Are you so wed to your idea that not only do you not admit when it doesn't work, you are also unwilling to change course to find a better solution (perhaps one suggested by a subordinate)?

In these internal situations, remember that perception is reality. You may want to seek input from a trusted advisor or key employee who is able to give you an objective read on employees' perception of you. You may think you are humble but it only

matters if the employees see it the same way.

From an outside perspective, I would also say be open to seeking input and information from others. Even if you have a strong game plan you are comfortable with, getting an outside perspective can be valuable. There might be some minor tweaks in your plan that could contribute majorly to a successful implementation. At the very least, an outside confirmation that you are on the right track can go a long way to a good night's sleep.



What Does At-Will Employment Mean?

I frequently take calls from distressed people that have been recently fired, asking if it was legal for them to be fired and if their boss had to give them a reason. As is often the case, it depends.

Employment relationships in

South Dakota may be 'terminated at will,' which means an employer may terminate an employee at any time, and does not need a specific reason for doing so. Likewise, an employee is allowed to quit at anytime and does not need a specific reason to quit. This is often referred to as the at-will employment doctrine.

However, this doctrine does have exceptions. South Dakota recognizes four: (1) terminations that violate state or federal law; (2) terminations that are against public policy; (3) employees with express or implied contracts that require termination "for cause"; or (4) an employee who accepts employment upon the promise of a future promotion.

If one of these exceptions is applicable, a terminated employee may have a claim for wrongful termination against the employer.

Discrimination: Typically, terminations that involve the violation of a state or federal law involve some form of discrimination. South Dakota laws, and federal laws, prevent employers from firing employees as a result of their age, race, gender, disability, ethnicity, religious beliefs, ancestry or country of origin. South Dakota employees also may not be fired for serving jury duty in the state and also have some protections for smoking.

Public Policy: South Dakota recognizes an employee's right not to be terminated in violation of public policy. This essentially means that an employer cannot terminate an employee for reasons that violate established public policies, or contradict sentiments of the general public.

This would then prevent someone from being fired for pursuing a worker's compensation claim or discrimination claim, or for refusing

to perform a criminal act for their employer.

Breach of Contract:

In South Dakota, an employer must follow the terms of any written or verbal contract with an employee. If a contract exists, then the employer cannot terminate the employee in violation of the terms of that contract.

Promise of Future Promotions: If an employee can prove that he or she accepted a job because the employer promised a future promotion to a certain position, South Dakota courts may find that employee was no longer an at-will employee.

Employees who believe they have been wrongfully terminated may have a claim against the employer. However, there are often administrative processes that must be followed, and there is a strict period of time within which to file a claim. These laws are very complex, and failure to strictly comply can result in an otherwise valid claim being dismissed. It is very important to consult with an attorney experienced in employment law as quickly as possible.

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USS South Dakota is Navy's Newest Nuclear Submarine

USS South Dakota (SSN 790) is the Navy's newest nuclear submarine, commissioned on Feb. 2, 2019. It is the 17th Virginia-class attack submarine to join the fleet. It was a true honor to be a part of the

commissioning event.

USS South Dakota will play an important role in the mission of our sailors, and it will also serve as a new symbolic link between our state and the Navy. According to the U.S. Navy, it has been designed to fulfill the seven core competencies of the submarine force: anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, delivery of Special Operations Forces, strike warfare, irregular warfare, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance and mine warfare.

This new submarine includes

state-of-the-art technology designed to increase stealth, as well as a revised bow and sonar panels that will allow it to better detect and track other submarines in its area. USS South Dakota is a 7,800 ton vessel, is 377 feet long and will be manned by 132 crew members.

It can stay at sea for up to three months at a time. Because it is a nuclear attack submarine, it will be armed with four torpedo tubes and can hold 12 Tomahawk cruise missiles that are capable of hitting targets more than 1.000 miles away.

USS South Dakota is the third commissioned Navy vessel to bear the name of our state. The first was an armored cruiser that was used between 1904 and 1912. The second USS South Dakota (BB-57) was a battleship commissioned in 1942. During World War II, it was vital in blocking Japanese forces from entering Guadalcanal. It was also involved in the Battle of Savo Island,

Battle of Philippine Sea, Okinawa and Iwo Jima, earning a total of 13

battle stars. USS South Dakota was present in Tokyo Bay on Sept. 2, 1945, for Japan's formal surrender. When newspapers or radio stations reported on USS South Dakota during the war, they referred to it as "Battleship X" or "Old Nameless" because the Navy wanted to hide information about the battleship from our enemies.

Several World War II veterans who served aboard BB-57 attended the commissioning ceremony of the newest USS South Dakota. It was very special to have them there to welcome the new submarine to the Navy. We're thankful to them for their service to our country. We are also thankful to the sailors who will serve aboard the new USS South Dakota.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, it was truly a privilege to witness the commissioning of this modern attack submarine. We are excited to welcome USS South Dakota to the Navy's fleet, where it will play an important role in our national security for decades to come. When BB-57 was launched in 1941, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said, "I say to the good ship South Dakota, God go with you, because after all, your mission, the mission for which we built you, is not war, but the prevention of war as God wills." USS South Dakota SSN 790 and its crew will play a significant role in our national security efforts. It will also serve as a tribute to South Dakotans' long history of service in our armed forces.

One Thing We Can All Agree On

There's unfortunately little doubt that we're living in an era where it's often more difficult than it needs to be for the two parties in Washington to come together on certain issues facing the country. I strongly believe

that it's important for elected leaders to have debates and exchange ideas, and I also believe we can have honest disagreements without being disagreeable with one another. It's a responsible way to govern - something we owe to the people who elected us to serve.

While there are plenty of policies over which there are robust disagreements these days - disagreements I know we will be able to overcome - there is at least one topic, among several, that always seems to have strong bipartisan support: ending illegal and abusive robocalls that are affecting people across the country, including in South Dakota.

No one is immune to these annoying and potentially dangerous calls. I receive them. My friends and family receive them. Even my 99-year-old dad receives them. According to the Federal Trade Commission and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), two federal agencies over which the Senate Commerce Committee has jurisdiction, unsolicited robocalls are among the top consumer complaints they receive, and it's no wonder.

How many times have you heard your phone ring, seen a somewhat familiar number or area code, and answered it only to find out it's either a scam or an unsolicited call that you had no interest in receiving. Some of these scammers intentionally target elderly victims and trick them into believing a family member is in trouble and urgently needs money. Others pretend to be a representative from a utility company and tell unsuspecting customers that without a quick payment, their power or water will be shut off. It doesn't matter what the

tactic is, their motives are despicable, and it must stop.


Illegal and abusive robocalls are a problem, but I don't want to confuse them with other automated calls on which many consumers often rely. For example, if you're on your way to the airport and your flight is canceled, if there's a fraud alert on your credit card, or if you're being reminded of an upcoming medical appointment, those are generally calls you want to receive. Different rules of the road apply for these types of calls, and they should.

When I was chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, I convened a hearing on the topic of illegal and abusive robocalls and heard from a wide range of individuals - from people who are tasked with targeting scammers and holding them accountable to the scammers

themselves. I actually issued a subpoena to compel the testimony of perhaps the most infamous robocaller known to U.S. officials, Adrian Abroamovich. He's currently facing \$120 million in FCC penalties for making nearly 100 million robocalls throughout the country.

At the end of 2018. I introduced bipartisan legislation that would give federal regulators more tools and greater flexibility to find illegal robocallers and penalize them for their actions. The Telephone Robocall Abuse Criminal Enforcement and Deterrence (TRACED) Act would also bring together relevant agencies at the local, state, and federal level to tackle this issue with a collaborative approach, which, I believe, will be required to win this fight.

I recently reintroduced the TRACED Act, and it enjoys the same kind of bipartisan support this year that it had last year. As chairman of the Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Communications, Technology, Innovation, and the Internet, I will be in a strong position to move the ball down the field on this important issue again this Congress. I think I can speak for all Americans when I say enough is enough. It's time to act on this, and I look forward to leading this important effort.

Are you interested in running for Mayor of Aberdeen or Northwest District City Council Member? If so, you can pick up a petition from the Aberdeen City Finance Office. 123 S Lincoln Street starting March 1st. Only registered voters of the city shall be eligible to hold office. If you are interested in the council position. check to make sure you are living in the Northwest District of Aberdeen by going to https://www.aberdeen. sd.us/108/Elections and clicking on the Voting District Map.

You must get 50 qualified signatures on your petition - at large for the Mayor's race and from the Northwest District for the council race. The deadline to submit the petition to appear as a candidate on the ballot is March 26th at 5:00 pm. Both positions are for 5 year terms starting July 1, 2019 and ending June 30, 2024.

Duties of a City Council Member: It is the duty of a city councilor to attend each city council meeting held every Monday of each month at 5:30 p.m., unless otherwise announced. The

City Council determines the direction of issues through the adoption of motions, resolutions, and ordinances. No action of the city council shall be valid or binding unless adopted by the affirmative vote of a majority

of a council quorum. All powers of the city shall be vested in the city council, except as otherwise provided by law or city charter and the council shall provide for the exercise thereof and for the performance of all duties and obligations imposed Council shall act as a


shall be a member of the city council with duties as indicated above, including the power to vote. In addition, the Mayor shall preside at meetings of the council, represent



Registered Apprenticeship Opportunity in the Works

Midstates Group is a locallyowned and operated print and media solutions company, founded in 1979. Over the years, we have grown into a multi-million dollar company with over 3,000 active customers, in all 50 states. A good majority of

our business consists of high-volume publications which are printed and mailed directly to the end customers' doorsteps. These pieces are printed on a "Web Press" - which is a large press that prints high quantities on a continuous roll of paper. Although in high demand, skilled "Web Press Operators" are becoming harder and harder to find, so companies are finding unique and creative ways to recruit candidates.

Midstates Group is no exception. We recruit talent through several

different avenues, so when the SDDLR announced the possibility of grant funding to help employers create a "Registered Apprenticeship" program, it was a perfect opportunity to try another avenue. First, it will allow us to advertise to candidates that there is an opportunity for a recognized career at Midstates Group. Secondly, it will allow our current employees to earn a licensed certificate with the state. Third, a registered apprentice program creates the possibility of attracting more people to the printing industry since the technical skills learned at Midstates Group are transferrable to other printing companies.

After submitting the application and supplemental documentation, Midstates Group was awarded \$30,000 in grant funding from the StartTodaySD Incentive to aid in the development of a formal registered apprenticeship program for "Web Press Operators" specifically. The program is still in the development stage, but will follow our existing in-house training. We have historically been more successful training operators in-house because



newly hired employees typically have no prior printing experience when they begin their career at Midstates Group. Most employees hired into the company started in an entry level position where they learned the basics and built upon their skills. Today, we have around 250 employees who have become experts in all facets of the industry, from print to postal optimization, and we know a registered apprenticeship will help us add to that number.

Partnerships in support of the registered apprenticeship program include South Dakota Department of Labor and Regulation, Aberdeen Central High School A-TEC Academy, Aberdeen Area Chamber of Commerce, Department of Human Services Division of Rehabilitation Services, Printing Industry Midwest, 4S Consulting and DTC, LLC.




