

## Aberdeen's New Family Planning Clinic



On June 1, the Aberdeen Community Health Center operated by Horizon Health Care became the family planning clinic for Aberdeen.



Cassandra Aesoph, CNP; and Catherine D. Friesen, CNP; are currently seeing family planning patients. Horizon offers care to its patients regardless of their ability to pay or their insurance status. A sliding payment scale is offered based on an income assessment. Confidential services are also available to family planning patients, meaning they are able to receive services if cost, insurance coverage or confidentiality is a concern.



When the state reached out to Horizon about taking over the family planning services in Aberdeen, Horizon Nurse Manager Lindsey

Heath said it was an easy decision to make.

"It was an easy transition to say yes and have Aberdeen become the family planning clinic," Heath said. "It increased access to those services, which was great."

The Family Planning clinic previously in the Aberdeen community provided family planning services; however, a provider was only on site in Aberdeen one to two days per month. The nursing and front-desk staff were there every day and could provide some patient services, but conducting



annual physicals, administering birth control and writing prescriptions needed a medical provider. Horizon was uniquely positioned to take on the family planning role, Heath said, because the organization already had eight family planning locations. Medical providers were on site in Aberdeen every day allowing increased access for patients needing family planning consultations and annual medical exams. Horizon was able to secure additional grant funding to take on the new patients.

The basic family planning services provided include annual physicals, pap smears, pregnancy checks, contraceptive care, birth control, STD checks and the CHC can provide basic infertility counseling, Health said. Providers will counsel and educate patients on their options if experiencing infertility. Mammography services and breast health screenings are not covered under the family planning program but are covered by the Department of Health's All Women Count program.


"We want the community to know we're here to provide services," Heath said. "It was a great thing for the community to know that Horizon is here for you. If you need us, just give us a call."



### Committee Chronicles

Ag – The committee met on July 21 at the SDSU Extension Regional Center where the committee discussed upcoming events including Field to Fork and the campus ag education event. They also finalized changes to the ag appreciation events starting in 2023, including discontinuing the Ag Appreciation Banquet as it has looked in the recent past. The committee, along with Chamber Board members and ag producers from the area, met with US Senator Thune on August 18 at the Brown County Fair. The major topic of discussion was the new farm bill which is being crafted in the Senate.

**Enhance Aberdeen** – The group is doing a call for art that will result in the installation of vinyl art on three utility boxes in Aberdeen: one on campus at NSU and two in the downtown core area. The annual celebration of the Americans with Disabilities Act took place on July 24 at the Red Rooster. Tommy's Express Car Wash, Haggerty's and Laundry on 6th Avenue were recognized for improvements made to their businesses.





## Think Before You Type: Email Privacy in the Workplace

Are your email communications being monitored right now? Given the increased reliance on computers and electronic communications to do business, and the use of technology that has enabled employers to monitor virtually all workplace communications on work computers, most employees are often surprised and disappointed to learn most of their communications are indeed being monitored. But employees do not shed all privacy rights at the work place door. While employers have the legal right to monitor most employee communications, federal law does limit how employers are able to obtain electronic communications, which includes e-mails, text messages, or even social media postings.

In 1986, the Congress passed the Electronic Communications Privacy Act ("ECPA"), which prohibits an employer from intentionally intercepting the oral, wire and electronic communications of employees. However, the ECPA contains several exceptions to this prohibition, and two of these exceptions are of particular importance to employers. The first is commonly known as the business purpose exception, which permits employers to monitor oral and electronic communications as long as the company can show a legitimate business purpose for doing so. The second is the consent exception, which allows

employers to monitor employee communications provided they have their employees' consent to do so.


The Stored Communications Act (SCA) is part of the ECPA and prohibits an entity providing an electronic communication service to the public from knowingly divulging the contents of an electronic communication. It applies only to communications in which the employee had a reasonable expectation of privacy. When an employer establishes a clear policy that certain communications are not protected, the SCA likely will not apply to all electronic communications.

Given the federally protected privacy implications, before any employer decides to monitor employee electronic communications the following key provisions should be incorporated into a clearly established written policy:

- 1. Specify what is governed by the monitoring policy and inform employees that monitoring and searches can occur at any time, for any reason, with or without any further notice.
- 2. Establish that the employer's computer and telephone systems and other equipment are the property of the employer, and employees should not maintain any expectation of privacy while using them or personal property to conduct company business.
- 3. Specify that the employer's computers, telephones and other equipment are intended for business use, with only a limited amount of personal use being acceptable.
- 4. Prohibit the transmission or downloading of any material that would be considered offensive, pornographic, obscene, profane, discriminatory, harassing, or otherwise unlawful.
- 5. Prohibit the dissemination of the employer confidential information or trade secrets to any outside source.
- 6. Explain that all communications and documents are subject to employer monitoring and that the employer has access to all such documents, even if deleted from the system.
- 7. Inform employees that unauthorized use of the employer's information systems can result in discipline, up to and including termination.
- 8. Require all new hires to sign a written acknowledgment that they have read and understand the policy and they agree to abide by its terms as a condition of employment with the employer. Have all employees to reaffirm their understanding of the policy at regular intervals, such as annual review meetings.

Understanding the ways a business can legally monitor an employee's electronic communications is essential to running a business smoothly. Speak to an attorney well versed in these laws to ensure your current policy is legally compliant.

## Supporting South Dakota Agriculture

Whether it's a natural disaster or an ordinary day, farmers and ranchers are always at the top of my mind. Agriculture is the lifeblood of the South Dakota economy, and I am committed to doing everything I can to ensure that our farmers and ranchers have the resources they need to help feed our country. I'm fortunate to be a longtime member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, which gives me an important platform from which to address the needs of South Dakota ag producers.

Right now, a big focus of mine is the 2023 farm bill. I've already begun to hold a series of roundtables to hear from South Dakota farmers and ranchers about what they need from the 2023 bill, and I plan to continue introducing proposals that I hope to get included in it.

My Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Improvement Act, which I introduced in March, would make CRP grazing a more attractive option by providing cost-share payments for all CRP practices for the establishment of grazing infrastructure, including fencing and water distribution. It would also increase the annual payment limit for CRP, which has not changed since 1985, to help account for inflation and the increase in land value.

I'm also working with colleagues from other agriculture states on legislation based on my conversations with South Dakota farmers and ranchers. I introduced the Agriculture Innovation Act with Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.). Currently the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) collects reams of data on conservation practices. The problem is that a lot of this data is often not analyzed and presented in a way that would be useful for producers.

The legislation Sen. Klobuchar and I have introduced would provide for better processing and development of the data USDA collects so farmers and ranchers can evaluate the impact of conservation and other production practices on things like soil health, crop yields, and profitability. Our bill would make it easier for producers to decide what conservation practices to adopt by, among other things,

helping identify the ways conservation practices can improve their bottom line.

In addition to farm bill priorities, I've been spending a lot of time focused on trade, which has played a large part in America's economic success for decades. Strong trade policy is critical for American ag producers, who depend on exporting their products around the globe. It is unacceptable that the Biden administration has dropped the ball on pursuing increased market access for American producers.

I recently led a letter with 23 of my Senate Republican colleagues to the U.S. trade representative and the secretary of agriculture urging them to prioritize increased access to foreign markets for American producers, including – and especially – American ag producers. Unfortunately, the administration has not made market access commitments a priority in its trade agenda, and the administration has failed to pursue any ambitious market-opening initiatives or comprehensive trade agreements.

Another issue I'm committed to addressing is America's beef labeling system. As South Dakotans know, cattle producers in our state produce some of the highest quality beef in the world. But the current labeling system for beef is unfair to American cattle producers and misleading for consumers. As I have said before, when you see a 'product of the USA' label on the grocery store shelf, it should mean just that. That is why I introduced bipartisan legislation with Sen. Jon Tester (D-Mont.) to require clear and accurate labeling for beef, and I will continue to stand up for mandatory country of origin labeling and South Dakota cattle producers.

Our nation depends on our farmers and ranchers, and I am profoundly grateful for all of the determined men and women who have chosen this way of life and are committed to helping pass it on to future generations. I am honored to represent South Dakota's farmers and ranchers in the Senate, and I will continue to do everything I can to ensure that they have all the resources they need to continue to feed our nation and the world.

## Starting a Tradition - Reflections on Community Development Efforts

How many times do you have to do something before it becomes a tradition? I am not sure, but I may be starting a tradition with this article. I arrived as your City Manager in June 2020. In August 2020, I found myself writing my first article for the upcoming Progress magazine. I used that article to introduce myself and shared my first impressions of Aberdeen. I have written an article for every edition of Progress since, albeit on a variety of topics. In August 2021 I dedicated the article to reflection on my first year and looking ahead at the future. Getting back to

and looking ahead at the future. Getting back to the question I posed, I may be starting a tradition in that I want to reflect on some areas of improvements that I highlighted in my article one year ago and contemplate on the future.


Last year I identified three areas that I felt were strengths within our community - education, value based agriculture, and quality of life amenities. I still stand by those strengths and could give countless examples why. These topics come up several times a week - almost always in a positive light. I won't bombard you with examples, but a recent one that comes to mind is the recent opening of the first inclusive playground. Besides a first here, it is one (if not the first) of the first in the state. This is an example

of multiple partners coming together to do something great for our community. If you haven't taken your children to Storybook Land to check it out, you should do so soon. They will thank you for it!

I also identified some areas that we needed to see growth in order for our community to move onward and upward. Those were 1) water & wastewater infrastructure, and 2) housing & workforce. Both categories are critical to community and economic development efforts. Here are some updates on progress over the past year.

- Wastewater Infrastructure- Contingent on final budget approval by the City Council, major strides with wastewater infrastructure will begin in 2023. Design and engineering for a \$57 million wastewater plant expansion will be completed in 2023 and construction will begin by 2024. Completion of the project will be late 2025 or early 2026. Once completed, treatment capacity of wastewater will serve the development needs for many years with room for additional expansion.
- Water Infrastructure- Discussions regarding changing the Aberdeen water source to the Missouri River gained major traction in 2021. Since late last year, the City of Aberdeen has been in discussions with WEB Water, BDM Water, and the State of South Dakota to develop a project that will fulfill the water needs of Northeast South Dakota for the next 40 years. Branded as the WINS Project- "Water Innovations in Northern South Dakota"- the project will take a few years to develop operating agreements and secure funding for construction, but in the end will be worth the wait and will be a great regional partnership.
- Housing Development- The City has a less direct role in housing development, but this is an area that is also strong. New subdivisions continue to be added in a variety of locations in the City and are filling at a good pace. Discussions for development in new areas is also a topic of frequent discussion. Renovations of existing buildings downtown are also on the horizon. The City Council has continued to show their support in these new developments by allocating TIF (Tax Increment Financing) Funds.

As you can see, there have been positive developments in these key areas, but more work lies ahead. I am already excited thinking about what new successes I will be sharing this time next year!

#### High school business competition opens September 1

The capacity to have a great idea knows no age limits. The BIG Idea Competition invites highs school students to submit their best business ideas. The 2022 BIG Idea Competition is open from September 1 to October 31. Over \$35,000 in cash and scholarships to be awarded this year, the 15th anniversary of BIG Idea.

Students can submit their business idea entries online. The online application as well as various resources and examples can be accessed at the BIG Idea website: www. BIGIdeaSD.com. Along with eight finalists, four additional awards are up for grabs. For the marketing design competition, students can create an ad to support their business idea. In addition to the special category awards for the best ideas in Wellness and Agriculture Innovation, a new partnership with South Dakota Retailers Association has created the Hometown Business award.

Coordinator Kelly Weaver of the Small Business Development Center said, "Understanding the basics of business is an important life skill, regardless of career path. The BIG Idea Competition is a great way for students to learn about those business basics. For those students interested in pursuing a business, we can also connect them with resources and mentors to help further their entrepreneurial growth and business success." A 2021 finalist shared this about her experience with BIG Idea, "This competition has shown me the importance of business to solve real world problems and how to develop this company from scratch... I have not only grown more confident and ready to take on the challenge, but feel more empowered to start my business in the future."

Applications submitted by the October 31, 2022 deadline will be reviewed and ranked

by judges from across the state and beyond. The eight (8) top scoring entries will attend to the final competition and make a verbal presentation to determine the winner. Finalists will receive cash awards of \$100 to \$1,000 along with college scholarships to Northern State University, Presentation College and SD School of Mines & Technology. One winner will be chosen from among all the marketing design entries as well as each of the special categories. Prizes for these awards are \$500 cash and \$500 scholarship to Northern State.

The final competition and awards event is set for Wednesday, December 7, at Northern State University. Student finalists will make their presentations in the morning. All finalists and award winners will give an elevator pitch of their business idea at the awards ceremony Students will also hear from a panel of business owners from start up to seasoned owners.

Since inception in 2007, the BIG Idea Competition has involved nearly 4,400 students from over 100 schools. The competition is open to all high school students. ## Impacts of Inflation Seen by All

We are all seeing and feeling the impact of inflation. I asked my constituents if they are paying higher prices at the grocery store, restaurants, and department stores. Thousands of people responded to the survey, and the results were clear—94% of participants said they are paying more for food and goods.



Our economy has been giving us mixed signals. Our unemployment rate has returned to pre-pandemic levels, but the U.S. Chamber of Commerce reports our economy has 11 million job openings but only six million unemployed workers to fill those spots. Compared to February 2020, more than three million fewer Americans are participating in the labor force today.

Our GDP has decreased for the second quarter in a row, indicating a recession, while inflation continues to rise to its highest level in decades. The economy is hot, but it's also not. The Federal Reserve announced that it is raising interest rates—by .75 percent for the

second month in a row—to try to slow down growth. But our GDP is showing that growth is slowing.


We need to get people back to work to meet the demand as it continues to outpace supply. Increasing the efficiency of our supply chain by filling the truck driver shortage, shipping imports and exports in a timely manner, increasing processing capacity for new and small meat packers,

increasing the use of biofuels and domestic oil and gas production are huge components to combatting the rise of inflation and its impacts on consumers.

I've introduced and supported legislation that offer solutions for each of those components. My bills—the Ocean Shipping Reform Act and Butcher Block Act—along with year-round E15 and increasing access to Entry-Level Driver Training (ELDT) for new truck drivers will streamline our supply chain and increase supply. Tackling inflation is an all-hands-on-deck issue. While these policies are certainly not a silver bullet, implementing realistic solutions like these will certainly help.

## Cybersecurity is Good Business for Everybody!

National Cybersecurity Month is celebrated each October, however, everyday practices in cyber safety are required to protect personal and professional information throughout the year. While surveys show many small business owners may feel vulnerable to a cyberattack, there's a false sense of security that South Dakotans and our businesses are invisible or insignificant to cyber criminals because of our rural environment. In fact, the opposite is true – people and businesses in rural states like South Dakota are especially attractive cyber targets. Why? Cyber criminals assume most digital users including small businesses do not have the financial resources or know-how to protect data, intellectual property (IP), financial transactions, or websites from being compromised. Small businesses also tend to have a closer personal connection with their customers and a cyber breach may allow cyber thieves additional easy crime pathways.

Cyber-attacks are excessively more expensive than proactive cybersecurity measures. Cyber theft costs the U.S. economy billions of dollars each year, posing a threat for businesses, individuals, and other organizations. Every business that depends on a computer system and the internet is a potential target. Taking the time to be accountable and learn about cybersecurity is a smart first step in protecting small


businesses and customers. Follow these practical steps to get cyber savvy and protected:

- Get Updated: Ensure operating system, firewall, and anti-virus/malware software are consistently updated with the latest software fix 'patches' issued by providers. This includes smart phone technology updates as many financial transactions may now be conducted through phone applications.
- Backups and Recovery: Frequently backup (copy electronic data) on a storage device located offsite or digitally in the cloud.
- Train employees in identifying phishing emails and avoid clicking on attachments that may contain malicious software viruses.
- Remove non-essential software applications from servers and devices (e.g., games, streaming services, social media apps, etc.).
- Enable Multi-Factor Authentication for a more secure log-in.
- Use virtual private network (VPN) technology to connect all wireless devices to your server when using Wi-Fi outside an office's secure network.


