
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



Last year, over 40 were nominated, top 12 named and interviewed, and ultimately the 2022 Top 4 Under 40 crowned.



Aberdeen Public School District Fall Update

This fall, the Aberdeen Public School District is moving ahead with innovative new projects—while continuing its longtime commitment to empowering students to succeed.

The district made a move toward online forms for the fall, encouraging all parents to register for Infinite Campus to access student information such as school picture forms, the technology agreement and elementary classroom assignments.

"We want to reach our parents in the most convenient, accessible way possible, while also streamlining our own processes," said Aberdeen Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Becky Guffin.

Exciting new initiatives are also underway at the A-TEC Academy at Central High School. That includes a new greenhouse and farm bots for agriculture classes, a digital art class green screen with virtual reality, and an e-sports lab, among others. Growing Business and Workforce from Within

Greetings from the Aberdeen Development Corporation (ADC). In the last issue of the Progress magazine, I highlighted some initiatives the



ADC is very focused on. One of the areas, a concentration on retention of graduating students from NSU, will be the content of this article.

I have mentioned over the past six months there has been a lot of interest in our market from businesses looking to expand their business to our community. The first questions asked by any business looking at Aberdeen are always the same; first, what does the workforce look like and what does the incentive package include? As of late, the workforce question has dominated the discussion and I expect this to continue long into the future. The bottom line is that the math related to workforce just does not add up to lead to large workforce availability. To make growth possible in Aberdeen (and almost every other community as well) from a workforce solution perspective, a combination of many approaches is necessary. To this end, we are choosing to put our focus on retaining individuals who are already here in our community but are not permanent residents: NSU students.

I mentioned prior, the first step in this effort has been launched – the Aberdeen Internship Network. Now we are preparing to launch the second step in this effort, which be called Pathways. More information on this program will be forthcoming in the coming weeks. One of the paths within this program will be modeled after a recent success, where the ADC and NSU came together on a tremendous partnership several years ago. This partnership has had many successes over the years, but we recently

spawned our first large success – the support and launch of a new business in Aberdeen, eqUTI.

egUTI started as an idea by a now former student of NSU, Grace Kramer, who graduated from NSU in May of 2023. Grace participated in an annual Business Pitch Competition held in November of each year at NSU for students. At this competition we are looking for students who have an idea which could be turned into a business. Those who are interested will apply to the Governor's Giant Vision contest each year. This past year Grace was selected and placed second in the student category. Based on this success and Grace's desire to take a leap of faith and officially start eqUTI as a business, I had her come and pitch her business to Hub City Capital (an angel investment group made up of Aberdeen business people). After hearing from Grace, the group made the largest single investment in any startup it ever has.

This investment will allow Grace to realize her dream of starting her own business, but it also is a shining example of just one of the components of Pathways – to grow our own businesses and retain NSU students right here in Aberdeen! Additionally, we can use this example of a startup here in our community as an inspiration to other NSU students to undertake internships, pitch an idea they may have for a business or stay here in our community after graduation to work, live and play. This will boost our economy in countless ways and allow the ADC to continue to recruit new business to our community.

South Dakota's Expanding High School Business Competition is Open

The capacity to have a great idea knows no boundaries. Students are invited to submit their best business ideas to the 2023 BIG Idea Competition between September 1 and October 31. Over \$50,000 in cash and scholarships to be awarded this year. The BIG Idea Competition continues to expand as will feature one of South Dakota's own successful young entrepreneurs, John T. Meyer, at the final competition in December.

The online application as well as various resources and examples can be accessed at the BIG Idea website: www.BIGIdeaSD.com. In addition to the overall competition awards, students can compete for five special category awards. For the marketing design competition, students can create an ad to support their business idea. Special category awards will be given for the best ideas in Wellness, Agriculture Innovation, and Hometown Business. Blackout Industries will sponsor a new Makers category this year to recognize a business which makes physical products.

The BIG Idea Competition has always been marketed to South Dakota high schools. After recognition in a guidebook by the Institute of Competition Sciences, BIG Idea has received growing interest outside of South Dakota. Last year, a virtual competition was held for out-of-state students in addition to the traditional in person event for South Dakota students. Both competitions will be incorporated going forward.

Understanding the basics of business is an important life skill, regardless of career path, which is important to our sponsors. BIG Idea helps students interested in pursuing a business connect with resources and mentors to help further their entrepreneurial growth and business success. Students and teachers alike testify to the value of the competition - over 60% of participants say they are more interested in starting a business after competing.

Applications submitted by the October 31, 2023 deadline will be reviewed and ranked. The top scoring entries will make a verbal presentation to determine the

winners. Finalists will receive cash awards of \$100 to \$1,000 along with college scholarships to Northern State University and SD School of Mines & Technology. One winner will be chosen from among all the marketing design



entries as well as each of the special categories. Prizes for these awards are \$500 cash and \$500 scholarship to Northern State.

The final competitions are set for December 5 (virtual) and December 6 (in person). All finalists and award winners will give an elevator pitch for their business idea at the Awards Ceremony at Northern State University. The Awards Ceremony is open to the public and will feature keynote speaker John T. Meyer, co-founder of Lemonly and Executive Director of Leadership South Dakota. John and will share the stories and memories of his own entrepreneurial journey in his presentation, "Better Every Day - Stories of Grit, Growth, and Glory"


Prairie Arabesque Graces Downtown Aberdeen



A Strong Economy Helps Us Compete with China

The threat that China poses both militarily and economically is widely recognized. I'm proud that the Senate recently passed a strong defense bill that will enable the U.S. military to better deter Chinese aggression. But we also need to compete with China from a position of economic strength, and a key part of doing that is strengthening American industry and building a more resilient economy.

There's widespread agreement that competing with China requires stronger industry at home. But how we go about doing this matters. The president and Democrats in Congress have shown a preference for costly taxpayer subsidies for select industries. The level of government involvement in the economy they envision is a significant departure from our tested free enterprise system. And it's worth asking, what will be the result of increased government involvement in our economy in the long term? Will it stifle innovation in our most important engines of growth? Will small businesses and start-ups be able to compete with large, government-subsidized firms?




We now know that the green energy subsidies included in Democrats' so-called Inflation Reduction Act are largely going to large companies and often to companies based in foreign countries, including China. And the Biden administration has implemented subsidies

for semiconductor manufacturers in a way that goes far beyond the scope of the program. They are giving preference to companies using union workers and, in some cases, conditioning funding on companies offering employee benefits that align with their social agenda. This is the opposite of creating a level playing field – it's government using taxpayer dollars to pick winners and losers.

I believe that government should be focused on creating conditions in which businesses large and small can grow, innovate, and create jobs. Republicans' 2017 tax reform provides an example of this sort of pro-growth policy at work. It lowered our sky-high corporate tax rate to make American businesses more competitive and made it easier to recover the cost of a small business, farm, or ranch investing in themselves. The result was a stronger economy with rising wages and job creation, and companies bringing production back to the United States. Republican-led tax reforms have made our economy more resilient, and making these progrowth policies permanent would give American businesses and entrepreneurs the certainty they need to compete and grow.

We also need to resume a real and robust trade agenda. Trade opens new jobs and opportunities for American workers. It opens new markets for our agricultural products and other goods and services. And while the Biden administration has been largely inactive on trade for over two years, the rest of the world has not. In fact, China is negotiating or implementing a number of new trade agreements. It's clear that if the United States stays on the sidelines on trade, China will be happy to fill the vacuum. So, competing with China will require that we stay engaged and lead on trade.

The United States must rise to the occasion to compete with China. We have to compete from a position of economic strength, but we won't get there with the heavy hand of government meddling in the economy. I believe that America succeeds when innovators and entrepreneurs are empowered to do what they do best and government steps out of the way. I'll continue to push for pro-growth policies that put us in the best position to create opportunity at home and compete around the world.

history of business in South Dakota and its excellent service.

Before there was a state of South Dakota, there was Montgomery Furniture. For 135 years, this company has served South Dakota families. During that time, the same family has owned the business and has been a significant presence in the business community of South Dakota. Such longevity is truly rare and distinctive.

In 1884, George H. Montgomery left Vermont, heeding Horace Greely's advice: "Go West, young man." In 1888, one year before South Dakota became a state, Montgomery reached the area of Alexandria, SD where he established a furniture store and funeral home. The business grew and prospered, and in 1902, Montgomery and his brother-in-law, William Ryburn, built a two-story home in downtown Alexandria which housed the store, a bank, a law office, and Masonic Temple. After Montgomery passed, he left the

business in the hands of his son, W.R. Montgomery, and his son-inlaw, Gilbert Loomer.

A fire in 1964 destroyed the original building, but the family re-built. That same building houses Montgomery Furniture today. Over the years and generations, the business has expanded across the state with locations in Madison, Howard, Arlington, Sioux Falls, and Mitchell–offering furniture, home accessories, and flooring.


Today, Clark Sinclair and his son, Eric Sinclair of Madison, are coowners. Eric is the fifth generation of the hardy family who arrived in Dakota Territory, settled, put down roots, and stayed.

An exhibit featuring Montgomery Furniture and their legacy will be on display at the SD Hall of Fame's Visitor and Education Center in Chamberlain this summer (and throughout the year), along with the other 2023 Act of Excellence recipients.

The South Dakota Hall of Fame is a 501c3 organization designed to Honor, Inspire, and Educate. The Hall's mission is to Champion a Culture of Excellence and the SD Hall of Fame lives out its mission through its programming, including the Acts of Excellence Program. Investigations in the Workplace and Employer Obligations

Assume a female employee in your workplace reports she has been subjected to inappropriate sexual comments and unwanted touching in the workplace. What is your obligation as the employer? Do you tell her to toughen up, fire her, or immediately fire the person she has accused of inappropriate behavior? Ideally, your response should be none of the above. Unfortunately, Silver Bay Seafood Restaurant is learning this lesson the hard way, having recently been sued by the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) related to allegations it violated federal law when it subjected a female employee to a sexually hostile work environment.

According to the EEOC's lawsuit, in February 2021, a female employee working for the company was subjected to inappropriate sexual comments and unwanted touching by a male head server. The female employee reported the harassment to the company owners and to a manager, but they gave no indication they took the complaint seriously or that they would address the situation, and they did not investigate the reports. The lawsuit further alleges this was not the first time that head server had harassed a female employee. The EEOC claims that the company knew or should have known of the head server's propensity for sexual harassment and that it failed to take appropriate corrective action to


The takeaway for all employers is clear – when an employer becomes aware of any incident relating to sexual harassment or a sexually hostile work environment, it is critical the employer take prompt and effective action to fully investigate the situation and eliminate the conduct.

Your next question should then be, "How do I conduct this investigation?" Investigations can be complex, so the best advice is to consult with an attorney or independent third party with experience in conducting such investigations. At a minimum, an employer must take prompt, reasonable and effective corrective action, which includes:

- (1) Conducting a thorough investigation of the complaint by interviewing the accuser, the accused, and any witnesses to the conduct;
- (2) Promptly informing all parties of the results of the investigation;
- (3) Taking appropriate corrective action to enforce the employer's anti-harassment and anti-discrimination policies;
- (4) Maintaining confidentiality to the extent possible; and
- (5) Ensuring all persons involved follow the employer's anti-retaliation policy and ensuring no one participating in the investigation is subjected to any form of retaliation.

There are no specific step by step legal requirements, but the EEOC has published some guidelines. Ultimately, for any employer or employee faced with reports of inappropriate conduct in the workplace, the best practice is to consult with a professional who can guide everyone through the process of an investigation, provide advice as to the best actions to take once completed, and help everyone avoid a visit from the EEOC.

Funding our Adversary's Economy?

BlackRock, the world's largest asset manager, and MSCI, a top stock-market-index compiler, have been investing American retirement dollars in Chinese companies that strengthen China's military and pose security threats to America. Not just that, but more than 60 of these companies have been flagged by



U.S. agencies for security or human-rights violations.

This means Americans have been funding our biggest adversary's growth for years. The same communist government that steals Americans' personal data from apps like TikTok, spies on our allies' imports and exports, and sets up CCP police stations in America. Those are just the tip of the iceberg.

We've known it's a possibility that asset management firms have been investing in CCP-backed companies for a while and Congress has been working to bring clarity and accountability to these firms. Recently, the Select Committee on China launched an investigation into several venture capital firms for their funding of Chinese

tech companies. In the Senate, a bill is being worked on to require American companies that invest abroad, especially in countries like China, to disclose certain investments. The bill would also create a panel to review and block these investments that are national security concerns, similar to how the Council on Foreign Investment in the

United States (CFIUS) works.

MSCI and BlackRock manage a total of over \$22 trillion in assets. While these investments in Chinese companies can yield a high return, putting our national security at risk is not a wise trade. The means do not justify the ends.

The Select Committee on China expressed these concerns in a letter sent to BlackRock and MSCI. We requested a full accounting of the investments in Chinese companies—the American people deserve to know where their dollars are going and the type of un-American behavior it's advancing. I hope the Select Committee receives a response soon so we can hold these firms accountable.

From small pieces of jewelry to IT components to value added agriculture products and processed food to large pieces of equipment, urban and rural manufacturers across the state started with an idea that turned into a lucrative business and way of life. The SBA and many other federal agencies alongside federally funded resource partners provide support to small businesses wanting to start and grow revenue through exporting and government contracting.

EXPORTING plays a crucial role in international trade, economic growth, and globalization. Foreign countries hold two-thirds of the world's purchasing power, and nearly 96% of consumers reside outside the U.S. For small business owners, exporting can significantly impact their businesses. Here are some benefits of exporting:

- **Economic Growth:** Exporting allows businesses to access larger markets, leading to increased sales.
- **Diversification:** Expanding into international markets reduces dependence on domestic sales, providing a buffer against economic fluctuations.
- Profitability: Exporting can lead to higher profits, as businesses can tap into markets with higher demand or less competition.
- Job Creation: Companies engaged in exporting often create more jobs to meet the increased production demands.

Expanding small business markets through exporting is made easier by leaning on a network of support providers. Here are some resources for export and trade assistance:

GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS can be a lucrative opportunity for businesses and requires planning, preparation, and persistence. The federal government uses special programs to help small businesses win at least 23% of all federal contracting dollars each year. Some of the SBA flagship certifications for contracting include the following categories: service-disabled veteran owned small business, woman owned small business, HUBZone, and 8(a) for socially and economically disadvantaged business owners. Participating in these programs helps small businesses:

- Win a fair share of federal contracts.
- Qualify for exclusive set-aside and sole-source contracts.
- Partner with established contractors to win contracts.
- Get business mentoring and education to learn how federal contracting works.
- In addition to SBA assistance, APEX Accelerators (formerly known as Procurement Technical Assistance Centers) provide technical assistance to businesses interested in selling products or services to federal, state, and local governments. Additionally, APEX Accelerators can help your small business determine if you're ready for federal contracting.

SD Legislative Work Goes on Through the Summer

As we write this article, our policy makers in Pierre and elsewhere are working hard on issues that pertain to our region and preparing for their next sessions. By our next article, they will have taken some policy positions on key issues and make recommendations to the next legislative session and to others.

Over the course of the summer to date, much work has gone into several key issues important to us, such as implementation of the housing infrastructure investments the state has committed and identifying other key solutions. By the next Progress magazine, we hope to be able to report that projects in Aberdeen and the region were successful in receiving some of those loan or grant funds for the infrastructure portion of significant housing projects in our area. Aberdeen's fingertips are on that fund, and we are the proud supporters of several applications from our area.

Here are some of those issues for which we are awaiting recommendations that help us:


• Long-Term Care and its Sustainability—A key group of lawmakers volunteered for this study committee, which is important to this region and beyond. That talent should be able to identify several key recommendations that the state and


legislature may be able to implement to sustain the long-term care system throughout the state.

- County Funding Issues—Another key group of lawmakers are serving on this committee, including a few who have served as county commissioners. They are doing some thoughtful hearings, with a few more to come, to identify ways the state can assist the counties with their mounting resource issues, especially without many financial options.
- Appropriations—The Interim Joint Appropriations Committee is working hard once again to do several things: keep their eyes on the state's revenues, as well as remaining federal ARPA dollars, childcare progress, workforce issues everywhere, and so much more. We hope to be able to host them in Aberdeen by the time you read this article to show them how their resources are being valued and deployed in our area.
- Water—We are hoping that additional state and federal resources can be deployed in our region for the WEB Water, Aberdeen and BDM project, known as "WINS". Considerable engineering, preparation, legal and policy work has been undertaken to deploy the resources WEB has invested plus the federal and state resources awarded recently. We can all be very proud of this work. This project is "ARPA ready".
